People are Messy, by Judith Johnson, is a powerful film from Theatre of Debate. People are Messy tells the story of two very different boys with a rare disease - aplastic anaemia. Their consultant seeks funding for his research into this condition, but must first demonstrate the involvement of the public with the help of long-term patient Vik and newly diagnosed Jake.

Following the screening, there will be a discussion on why it is important for people to be involved in health research. Professor Paul Seddon and Dr. Khalid Ali, as well as representatives from the National Institute for Health Research and members of the Young Person's Advisory Group (YPAG) Kent, Surrey & Sussex for health research, will be on the panel to answer questions.
